Victims of Human Trafficking: There are 50 million victims of human trafficking across the world and as many as 5,000 in the Diocese, hidden in plain sight in your neighbourhood. Pope Francis describes human trafficking as "blood money" and a "crime against humanity". We are all called to combat this evil trade. Assisted Suicide Bill: You will all be aware that the Bill has moved to the Committee Stage. It is evident that many of the concerns which were expressed before the Second Reading vote have already been validated. The overall allocation of time for detailed discussion has been much limited by the fact that the proposal is moved as a Private Members Bill. Valid criticism has been raised in many quarters regarding the bias on expert input to the Committee, many opponents of the proposals being excluded. Even the Royal College of Psychiatrists were initially not included on the list of those who would address the Committee. There was a refusal to seek the opinions of those who would highlight how the legislation in Canada has suffered a sequence of alterations which have loosened safeguards. One of the most significant safeguards that was highlighted in the initial sponsoring the Bill was the proposed involvement of a High Court Judge. It seems likely that this element will be removed. When the Chief Medical Officer for England and Wales, Sir Chris Whitty, offered evidence to the Committee, he highlighted the dangers of the proposed legislation being rushed. He also commented on how extremely difficult it is to define terminal illness. The Bishops' Conference of England and Wales will issue a joint Pastoral Letter soon. We are urged to write to our local MP to express opposition in principle to assisted suicide and to the now deeply flawed parliamentary process.
