This will be followed by our second discussion evening on some of the proposals from the recent Synod held in Rome. It also provides the opportunity for an evening Mass for those unable to attend our daily morning Mass.

Stations of the Cross: will next take place at Aldeburgh on this coming Friday, 8th March at 12noon. Please let me know if you, or a group, would like to lead a session.

Two years ago, our parish, alongside other parishes worldwide, held some constructive discussions on the directions the Church should take in the future. Information from those discussions was fed into the first Assembly of the Synod in October 2023. A second Vatican Assembly is planned for the end of this year. Meanwhile, the Vatican has published a synthesis of the 2023 discussions, with some firm proposals of areas to be further explored in the 2024 sessions. These may lead to real change within the Church. As a Lenten exercise, our parish is organizing four short opportunities to discuss some of these proposals (no more than an hour maximum); two in Leiston, two in Aldeburgh. Your presence would be welcome and a summary of our discussions will be submitted to the diocese.

Readings for The Third Sunday of Lent (Year B)

First reading

Exodus 20:1-17

God spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

'You shall have no gods except me.

'You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the greatgrandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments.

'You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it.

'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work that day, neither you nor your son nor your daughter nor your servants, men or women, nor your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that these hold, but on the seventh day he rested; that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day and made it sacred.

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money-changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the moneychangers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.
